## [Desert Senita Community Health Center](#)

Behavioral health staff currently provide counseling services for depression, anxiety, stress, and other conditions. Individual, family, and group counseling services are available. Desert Senita contracts with many of the private insurance plans to provide these services.

For participants in the AHCCCS (Medicaid) program who live in or near Ajo, the State of Arizona contracts with the Regional Behavioral Health Authority (RBHA) for traditional counseling, case management services, and for services for individuals with a Serious Mental Illness (SMI) designation.
